The Right of the Palestinians to Education

International and local charters and treaties have guaranteed the right to education as a fundamental pillar of human rights, as stated in Article 24 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. In turn, Article 2 of the Palestinian Higher Education Law stipulates that higher education is a right for every citizen who meets the necessary requirements. Therefore, we are facing a guaranteed and safeguarded right for the Palestinian people, who continue to struggle to attain their basic rights, including higher education, which should be enjoyed freely and safely within a system of equal opportunities for all. For decades

under Israeli occupation, this right has been continuously undermined, with educational infrastructure, students, and academic staff being systematically targeted. Despite these challenges, Palestinians have demonstrated resilience and innovation in maintaining and developing their educational system. The higher education sector is a cornerstone of sustainable development for Palestinian society, representing history and shaping future generations. It serves as a source of qualified human resources capable of innovation and leadership in various vital sectors such as health, education, and the economy. This article aims to highlight the challenges imposed by the occupation, how to maintain the continuity of the educational process under current conditions, the potential for considering the Palestinian educational experience as a model for countries affected by wars, and providing a roadmap to ensure the right to education and its quality amid ongoing conflicts worldwide.

The Israeli occupation has had a profound impact on the Palestinian educational system, through its continuous attempts to weaken the educational process and target students and academic staff. Since the first Palestinian uprising in the late 1980s, the occupation has sought to close Palestinian universities and disrupt higher education as part of its strategy to suppress Palestinian resistance. Educational institutions have faced repeated closures, curfews, military raids, and infrastructure destruction. In 2024, this onslaught was particularly severe; according to a report issued by the Palestinian Ministry of Higher Education, Israeli military operations destroyed 75% of the infrastructure of 19 educational institutions in Gaza. This destruction targeted physical infrastructure as well as the assassination and arrest of university presidents, faculty members, and students, significantly impacting the continuity of education. Additionally, restrictions on movement between Palestinian areas exacerbated the situation, preventing over 150,000 students from accessing higher education either fully or partially, and forcing institutions to rely on methods such as online and blended learning. Additionally, the occupation impedes the attraction of international academic expertise and participation in academic and student exchanges and global academic conferences, isolating Palestinian academia from the broader global educational community. This isolation not only affects the quality of education and research in Palestinian universities but also limits the opportunities for Palestinian students and professors to interact with their international counterparts and benefit from modern scientific and academic advancements. Despite these harsh conditions, the Palestinian academic community demonstrates resilience and creativity in finding alternative solutions to maintain and develop education, reflecting a strong determination to confront challenges and uphold the right to education as a fundamental right that cannot be compromised.

In response to the challenges imposed by the Israeli occupation, Palestinians have increasingly turned to e-learning and continuous education as vital tools to ensure the quality and continuity of education. Although e-learning platforms have helped educational institutions maintain educational activities despite material barriers and movement restrictions, there are serious concerns

about the quality of outputs from this system. One of the fundamental problems is that online education inhibits direct interaction with instructors, reducing the effectiveness of engagement and affecting the quality of education. Additionally, the available tools for e-learning are limited in virtual classrooms and some published materials, and there is no integrated system for e-learning that can meet all the needs of students and academics. Despite the regularity of the educational process through technological means, there has been a noticeable decline in students' academic achievement, which is not necessarily indicative of the quality of the educational process. Many students complain about their inability to concentrate and understand the material presented during online lectures, highlighting the need for constructive criticism to improve the e-learning process.

In addition, the current generation of students has experienced the COVID-19 crisis, which has led to their disruption from traditional education in one way or another, adding new challenges for them. There should be a focus on developing educational strategies that go beyond the current challenges and ensure better interaction between students and instructors. Enhancing direct interaction by developing educational tools and platforms that enable students to interact better with lecturers and peers, such as live discussion sessions and hands-on workshops, and improving educational tools through investing in the development of a comprehensive system for online education including comprehensive digital libraries and updated and diverse educational resources, are considered priorities. Additionally, training instructors through providing training programs on the best practices in online education, and providing psychological and educational support to students to help them adapt to the online learning environment and improve their academic performance, are essential. Furthermore, regular assessments of the quality of online education and its outcomes should be conducted, and the roles of accreditation and quality assurance bodies should be developed, utilizing these assessments to continually improve the educational process. Amid challenging circumstances, the Palestinian academic community demonstrates resilience and creativity in finding alternative solutions to maintain and enhance the continuity of

education. However, it is essential to address existing challenges to ensure that online education is not only a means to overcome current barriers but also an effective tool for achieving high-quality education for all students.

To enhance the right to education for Palestinians, it is necessary to develop a roadmap towards maintaining the continuity and improving the quality of the learning process within the context. This roadmap includes key measures and strategies to address challenges and enhance the continuity and quality of education. Firstly, it is essential to reform and develop the educational infrastructure, conduct a comprehensive assessment of the educational infrastructure, and prioritize areas for reform and development. Securing funding from international donors, government budgets, and partnerships with the private sector is crucial for rebuilding and developing educational facilities. Additionally, investing in technological infrastructure to support models of online and blended learning is necessary to ensure the continuity of the educational process amidst current challenges.

On the other hand, financial sustainability is crucial for the success of maintaining the education system. Establishing endowment funds for higher education to provide sustainable financial support and enhancing partnerships with the private sector to obtain funding through corporate social responsibility initiatives are essential. Additionally, frameworks for quality assurance and accreditation must be established to ensure that educational programs meet international standards and align with the needs of the job market. This requires developing a comprehensive framework for quality assurance, including regular assessments and feedback mechanisms, and regularly updating curricula to incorporate modern educational methodologies and align them with the evolving needs of the labor market.

Priority should be given to investing in research and innovation. Key steps include allocating funding for research and development within university budgets, establishing research centers focus-

ing on priority areas such as health, technology, agriculture, and environmental sustainability. Additionally, incentives should be provided to faculty and students to participate in research projects, and partnerships with international research institutions and organizations should be enhanced for joint projects and knowledge exchange.

Programs for exchange and partnerships with international universities should be established to facilitate the mobility of students and faculty members, and joint degree programs with reputable international institutions should be developed to offer dual qualifications. Additionally, participation in international conferences, workshops, and seminars should be encouraged to promote knowledge exchange and networking. In addition to capacity building through providing continuous professional development opportunities for faculty and staff, establishing mentoring programs to support academics and administrators at the beginning of their careers is crucial. To ensure inclusivity and equity, scholarship and financial aid programs should be developed to support marginalized and disadvantaged students, and awareness programs should be implemented to increase awareness of higher education opportunities among underrepresented communities. Furthermore, support services should be provided, including academic advising, career advice, and promoting policies and practices that enhance diversity and inclusivity within higher education institutions.

In conclusion, preserving Palestinians' right to education amid the challenges imposed by decades of Israeli occupation can be achieved through following a roadmap based on community engagement, international partnerships, technology, and continuous support. By learning from the Palestinian experience and implementing a strategic roadmap, other conflict-affected areas can also strive to ensure the continuity and quality of education. Collaboration between the government, universities, civil society, and international partners is essential to achieve these goals and ensure that everyone has the opportunity to pursue higher education and contribute to the sustainable development of their nation.

The Board of Directors of the Arab Council for Academic Exchange holds its first meeting



The first meeting of the Board of Directors of the Arab Council for Academic Exchange was held at the headquarters of the General Secretariat of the Arab Universities Union in the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan. 
